Welcome Students to Internet Competency Skills

- In the beginning of the class we will be learning about the Internet: Its history; structure; features and its future. We will use the Internet tools to use the Internet for educational and business research. Some of these skills are already known to you.
- Later we will study the proper ways to qualify, phrase and refine questions. You will learn how to critical evaluate your research sources and be able to evaluate and cite references. You will study about doing business on the Internet. Finally we will study the economic, societal, ethical and legal issues of accessing and using material from the Internet. These skills will be invaluable in your education and your life during and after college.
- The textbook is using Internet Explorer version 8, but you can use any browser you want.

HOMEWORK is at the end of the each Chapter: 1 - Do the "**Test Your Knowledge**" questions. These are 10 questions **True/False** and 10 **Multiple Choice** questions (just give me the numbers and the answers). 2 - In a short paragraph in your own words, write a summarization of the "**Chapter Review**". Turn this homework in ASAP after each Chapter.

I suggest you re-read the "**Terms to Know**" and review any term you have questions on - These jargon words are very important for testing your competency and will possibly come up when being interviewed for almost any type of job.). I also suggest you read only the "**Exercises**" at the end of the chapters for added thoughts and insights into your understanding of the Chapter.

FINAL will be 11 short essay questions. There are "**Objectives**" on the first page of each Chapter. I want you to answer with a short paragraph these specific "**Objectives**" questions. Chapter 1 - 1,2,3,4 Chapter 2 - 1,2,7 Chapter 3 - 1,6 Chapter 4 - 1,2,5. Again this will be 11 short paragraphs.
